S.T.E.A.M. PROGRAM



The newest Program Area FSR STEAM Lab provides Scouts hands-on introductions to STEAM fields through merit badges and competitions.

COWBOY ACTION

This program offers a fun and safe introduction to cowboy action shooting with pistols, rifles, and shotguns. Campers experience with opportunities to shoot single-action .22-caliber pistols, lever action .22-caliber rifles, and 20-gauge shotguns.

The Rifle Range offers Scouts the opportunity to earn the Rifle Shooting Merit Badge and compete in the Silver Bullet Competition.


Scouts can earn the Shotgun Shooting Merit Badge and compete in the Golden Shotgun competition at the Shotgun Range.



ARCHERY

At the Archery Range, Scouts can earn the Archery Merit Badge and compete in the Golden Arrow shooting competition. The range offers multiple types of targets and distances to challenge even the most experienced archers.

The Ken Staab Action Archery Range provides a challenge for Scouts and Scouters to test their archery skills. The course takes participants into the wilderness to shoot at life size 3D animal targets.

BADEN

POWELL

Camp Jayhawk has two related programs for first year campers to work on rank advancement and getting started with Scouting. Baden Powell is the primary program where Scouts spend every morning session working on knots and lashings, orienteering, aquatics safety, and nature. Camp Jayhawk also has the Project First Class program for those who want to participate in the Baden Powell program, but only need those First Class requirements.

C.I.T. PROGRAM

Being a Counselor in Training is a great way for Scouts who are 14 years old to became a part of the Camp Staff. CITs will learn more about Scouting, Camp Jayhawk, and develop their leadership skills for anywhere from one week to the entire summer.
