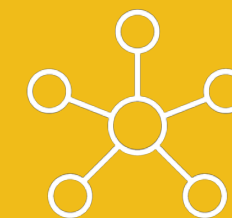

FSR OUTPOST



Two Outposts Adventures that take Scouts off Camp will be incorporated into Camp Program this year. One will take place during Merit Badge time and the other will be an overnight adventure.

S.T.E.A.M. PROGRAM



The newest Program Area added to Camp Jayhawk, the FSR STEAM Lab provides Scouts hands-on introductions to STEAM fields through merit badges and competitions.

COWBOY ACTION



This program offers a fun and safe introduction to cowboy action shooting with pistols, rifles, and shotguns. Campers 14 years of age or older can take part in a special shooting experience with opportunities to shoot single-action .22-caliber pistols, lever action .22-caliber rifles, and 20-gauge shotguns.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

Campers can embark on ecological related adventures, fish at the lake and ponds, or challenge themselves to achieve the impressive Mile Swim BSA award. They have the opportunity to attend the inter-faith worship service on Wednesday evening. Scouts can also earn the Paul Bunyan Woodsman Award or participate in tomahawk throwing.



COMPETITIONS

EVENING & FRIDAY PROGRAM

Every evening there are optional programs that Scouts are invited to participate in. These programs include:

- Ironman Competition
- Cast Iron Chef Cooking
- Competitions
- Open Handicraft
- Open Swim

In addition to the evenings, Friday is reserved for many open areas for Scouts to finish up their Badges and have fun.

- Orienteering Challenge
- Target and Range Sports Competitions
- Mile Swim



AQUATICS AREA

SWIM DOCK

The Swim Dock is camp's most popular area. Open swim opportunities are offered every afternoon and evening to allow Scouts as much time as possible to stay cool during camp.

Merit Badges commonly taught at the Swim Dock include Swimming and Lifesaving.



ECOLOGY AREA

CONSERVATION

At the Camp Jayhawk Conservation Area, Scouts will engage with the hands-on work that the world of Ecology has to offer. Some programs that are commonly taught at the Conservation Area are Soil and Water Conservation MB and the Conservation Section of the National Outdoors Award.



BOAT DOCK

The Boat Dock gives Scouts multiple unique ways to enjoy Lake Jayhawk including: canoes, kayaks, row boats, and stand up paddle boards.

Merit Badges commonly taught at the

Boat Dock include:

- Canoeing
- Kayaking
- Rowing
- Small Boat Sailing

ECO LODGE

Want to learn more about the nature of Falley Scout Reservation? Consider taking a trip to the Ecology Lodge and check out the animal tanks and terrariums, or take one of the Ecology related Merit Badges.

Merit Badges commonly taught at the Ecology Lodge include:

- Nature
- Fishing/Fish and Wildlife Mang.
- Space Exploration/Astronomy
- Bird/Mammal/Insect Study
- Weather



T.A.R.S. AREA

RIFLE & SHOTGUN

The Rifle Range offers Scouts the opportunity to earn the Rifle Shooting Merit Badge and compete in the Silver Bullet Competition.

Scouts can earn the Shotgun Shooting Merit Badge and compete in the Golden Shotgun competition at the Shotgun Range.



HANDICRAFT AREA

WINGFOOT LODGE

The handicraft programs and Merit Badges commonly include:

- Woodwork
- Wood Carving
- Pottery
- Pulp and Paper
- Leather Working
- Textiles
- Sculpture

Open Handicraft time is also available for Scouts and Leaders to work on projects.



OUTDOOR SKILLS

Fire building, navigation, knots, survival, and more! In Outdoor Skills, Scouts will learn techniques they need on their camping adventures. These skills will be taught in:

- Emergency Preparedness
- Pioneering
- Orienteering
- Geocaching
- Search and Rescue
- Signs, Signals, and Codes
- Wilderness Survival



CAMP STAFF

The FSR Camp Staff is committed to providing exemplary customer service and teaching Scouts new and exciting topics. BADEN POWELL

Camp Jayhawk has two related programs for first year campers to work on rank advancement and getting started with Scouting. Baden Powell is the primary program where Scouts spend every morning session working on knots and lashings, orienteering, aquatics safety, and nature. Camp Jayhawk also has the Project First Class program for those who want to participate in the Baden Powell program, but only need those First Class requirements.

C.I.T. PROGRAM

Being a Counselor in Training is a great way for Scouts who are 14 years old to become a part of the Camp Staff. CITs will learn more about Scouting, Camp Jayhawk, and develop their leadership skills for anywhere from one week to the entire summer.

Over the age of 21 and want to volunteer at camp? Consider being a Volunteer Camp Commissioner. Assist the Camp program and Ranger Staff during one or multiple sessions of Camp.



CAMPSITES

WEST RIDGE

- Red Bud
- Twin Pines
- Red Cedar
- Oak Grove
- Walnut Hill
- Maple Leaf
- Hickory Point

These campsites are carved into the native prairie and provide a wide open site with endless possibilities. The West Ridge also has access to multiple facilities including the West Showers, hammock camping structure, and Bell Lodge.



CENTRAL RIDGE

- Bowie
- Bridger
- Pike
- Cody
- Crockett

The central ridge campsites are nestled in the woods. These campsites are located much closer to the Program Areas and have close access to the largest showering facility on camp, Central Showers.

CAMP FAQs

Q: How many Merit Badges can a Scout earn during their session?

A: It depends! Scouts build their own schedules once Merit Badge registration goes live. They can choose from a variety of Merit Badges, Awards, and other Adventures based on their interests.

Q: Which sessions can female Scouts attend?

A: Camp Jayhawk is open to female Scouts for all sessions. The facilities and program are designed to operate with Scouts from all walks of life.

Q: What should everyone bring with them to their session?

A: Summer Camp is similar to your average Unit campout except it's a week long. For a full list of what you should bring, visit the Camp Jayhawk web page. See back cover for more info.

Q: Can families visit their Scout(s) during their week of Camp?

A: Yes. Family night is Friday afternoon through evening of each session. Each member of the family will have to check-in at the Camp Welcome Center to receive a visitor badge. If family members plan on eating in the Dining Hall, they will have to buy a meal ticket at check-in.



ADULT OPPORTUNITIES

Camp Jayhawk can offer multiple trainings for Adult Leaders including:

- Safe Swim Defense
- Paddle craft Safety
- Hazardous Weather Training
- Leave No Trace
- And more

We offer more than just trainings for the Adult Leaders during their week at camp. Other activities include The Scoutmaster Merit Badge and participating in competitions.

There are two important guides to help Scouts and Leaders prepare for camp.

1. The Leader Guide will be published in early December and contains information regarding the base camp fees, information about camp facilities, advancement tracking, and other camp policies and procedures.
2. The Program Guide will be published by February 1st and contains information about Camp Check-In and Check-Out procedures, the Merit Badge / Activity Schedule, Daytime schedules, and all the planning information for what this season will look like.
